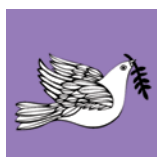
April

Agency Accomplishments

The Nature Conservancy

Problem:

Mass deforestation, and resultant catastrophic erosion, siltation of rivers, and sedimentation of rich coastal waters which threatens the biodiversity and overall economy of Haiti.

The severe environmental degradation in the watershed's upper basin in the Dominican Republic has led to high levels of sedimentation of the entire watercourse. This results in a significant reduction in Haiti's capacity to produce electricity and use the water for human consumption and agriculture.

Solution:

A multi-national project to remedy the major problem of insufficient water supply for Haiti.

With funding from AGI donors in 2007-08 (Rescue a River), The Nature Conservancy (TNC) is now working in eight communities along the Dominican-Haitian border to restore the Artibonite River watershed area. This successful project is coordinating reforestation activities and training of community leaders. Some accomplishments include:

- Thirty families received economic incentives as remuneration for the labor in nursery and planting activities.
- Thirty Haitian community members, and two technical staff representing local families, were trained to provide program participants with the skills needed to manage tree seedlings in the nursery, plant seedlings and maintain the plantation.
- As of February 2009, 45,000 fast growing eucalyptus trees have been planted. Survival rate of the plantation is estimated at 95-percent.
- Community members approved the allocation of 400 hectares of communal lands into the restoration program. This important decision could increase the number of participating families from 30 to approximately 100 families.

TNC has also been fortunate to secure the commitment of the Dominican Republic Ministry of Environment's national reforestation program, *Quisqueya Verde*. With this neighboring governmental participation, the Haitians are more likely to receive the support needed for future environmental restorations.

AGI and TNC foresee this as a forerunner to additional NGO/governmental collaborations. AGI is pleased to be part of this solution.
